Virtual town halls to discuss ERAP program changes

The Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) will hold two virtual town halls on Tuesday, Nov. 1 at noon and Thursday, Nov. 3 at 6 P.M. to discuss program changes. ERAP will stop accepting new applications and letters of intent (LOI) as of 11:59 P.M. on Nov. 10 in anticipation of running out of federal funds by early spring. The changes will ONLY impact individuals who have not previously received ERAP. The program will continue to fund extension requests for enrolled and eligible households for the time being.

ERAP is taking proactive steps to slow down the rate of spending so the program can assess the best use of the remaining funds and fulfill current obligations. The intent is to wind down the program in a way that gives currently enrolled renters time to prepare their finances to handle their future rental and utility payments.

LIEP helps low- and fixed-income households pay heating bills during winter months

Administered by the Wyoming Department of Family Services, the Low-Income Energy Assistance Program's (LIEAP) purpose is to help low- and fixed-income families and individuals pay their heating bills during the winter months. The federally-funded program gives priority to households that include elderly (60+), disabled and/or young children (5 and under). Seasonal LIEAP benefits are applied to a household's main heat source (the fuel your heat system uses to heat the home; not the power source needed to turn on the furnace). The LIEAP season for assistance with utility bills closes on February 28. Learn more at lieapwyo.org.
